



Toxic Substance Control Act (TSCA) Declaration

The Toxic Substance Control Act of 1976 (TSCA) is a federal regulation that allows the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to comprehensively manage chemicals in U.S. commerce. Under TSCA Section 6(h) Restriction on Persistent, Bioaccumulative and Toxic (PBT) Substances, final rules were published in January 2021 restricting five chemicals, including treated articles containing the chemicals, from distribution in U.S. commerce. Since then, the EPA has made several important changes, particularly affecting PIP (3:1) and DecaBDE. The most recent significant update became effective January 21, 2025.

Current TSCA Section 6(h) PBT Chemicals (Latest Update)

Chemical	CAS No.	Current Status
Decabromodiphenyl Ether (DecaBDE)	1163-19-5	Restricted. EPA revised the rule in 2024 with updated prohibitions, exclusions, and compliance dates effective January 21, 2025.
Phenol, Isopropylated Phosphate (3:1) (PIP (3:1))	68937-41-7	Restricted. EPA issued revised requirements and additional exemptions for certain articles and industries because of widespread use in electronics and electrical equipment. Revised rule effective January 21, 2025.
2,4,6-Tris(tert-butyl)phenol (2,4,6-TTBP)	732-26-3	Restrictions remain in effect with no major revisions.
Hexachlorobutadiene (HCBd)	87-68-3	Restrictions remain in effect with no significant recent changes.
Pentachlorothiophenol (PCTP)	133-49-3	Restrictions remain in effect with no significant recent changes.
